\$36 million to build jobs in Wide Bay

Job creation is a top priority for the Liberal Nationals Government, particularly in Wide Bay. Our Government has set aside \$28.5 million from the Regional Growth Fund to help establish a projectile forging plant in Maryborough, which will create 178 jobs.

In addition to this, the Wide Bay Burnett Regional Jobs and Investment Package is providing matching funds with business to generate \$14.6 million of new investment. More than 300 jobs in Wide Bay will be created through six significant projects to drive economic growth.

These initiatives will help people build new careers and also deliver a stronger economy for Wide Bay, ensuring more opportunities in 2019 and beyond.

Saluting Their Service

More than \$161,000 in federal grants will help support Wide Bay veterans and their families, and commemorate the Armistice Centenary.

Llew O'Brien announced **Cooroy Pomona** RSL Sub-Branch, **Cherbourg** Historical Precinct Group, **Maryborough** RSL Sub-Branch, **Maryborough** Military and Colonial Museum, **Gympie** RSL Sub-Branch, and **Mary Valley** RSL Sub-Branch will share \$48,774 to deliver local projects commemorating the Armistice Centenary.

These projects include exhibitions, murals, plaques, restoration works and a memorial book to commemorate Australia's wartime history and pay tribute to service men and women.

The **Tin Can Bay** RSL will receive more than \$45,000 as part of the Australian Government's Veteran and Community Grants (V&CG) program to upgrade its facilities including external shade areas.

More than \$68,000 is being provided for advocacy and welfare services to Wide Bay veterans, serving defence force members, and their loved ones in **Tewantin**, **Cooroy**, **Pomona**, **Gympie**, **Maryborough** and the **Fraser Coast and Country** through the Building Excellence in Support and Training (BEST) grants program.

"These grants honour the service and sacrifice of defence force personnel and recognise their significant contributions to our nation and our communities," Mr O'Brien said.

Mobile phone coverage extended

Sandy Strait residents and tourists now have improved phone coverage with a new mobile base station activated at **Maaroom**.

Federal Member for Wide Bay Llew O'Brien said the station was supported through the Liberal Nationals Government's Mobile Black Spot Program.

"Better mobile coverage at Maaroom means more people can now call, stream video and music, and work at home, on the road and on the water," Mr O'Brien said.

A total of 15 base stations in Wide Bay have been funded through the program including stations at Wide Bay Highway, Poona, Boreen Point and Cootharaba Road that will soon be in operation.

One-stop shop opens for financial complaints

Wide Bay shoppers and small businesses now have access to a free, fast and binding financial dispute resolution service with the Australian Financial Complaints Authority (AFCA) now open for business.

Member for Wide Bay Llew O'Brien said the new authority is a "one-stop shop" for all financial complaints, whether they relate to banks, credit providers, insurance companies or superannuation funds.

The ACFA was created along side the Royal Commission into misconduct in the banking industry, which came about after Mr O'Brien's strong advocacy raised attention to the problems experienced by families and investors.

FUNDING BUILDS STRONGER COMMUNITIES

Almost \$30,000 in Stronger Communities Program funding will help five Wide Bay community groups aid people needing medical care, increase water safety, improve facilities and deliver more services.

A \$15,000 grant for new vehicles will help keep the wheels of **Cooloola Coast** Medical Transport turning to continue its valuable service for people who need help getting to medical appointments.

Noosa Volunteer Coast Guard will receive \$3,500 for fire-fighting equipment and training room upgrades, and \$4,000 will help fund installation of solar panels on the **Tin Can Bay** RSL & Citizens Memorial Hall.

A \$4,800 grant will help South Burnett First Aid Volunteers provide disabled parking and allow wheelchair access to the **Murgon** Training Centre, while **Gympie** Chamber of Commerce will benefit from \$2,521 to purchase a data projector and equipment for use at its monthly functions.

More announcements will be made in the coming weeks.

The project will support 78 jobs through the construction phase, and once operational, the plant will create 100 direct manufacturing positions delivering flow-on economic benefits to Maryborough and Wide Bay.

Giving young apprentices a helping hand

Small businesses in Wide Bay will have a new incentive to employ young apprentices, with a \$60 million trial offering generous wage subsidies.

Under the Australian Apprenticeships Incentives Program (AAIP), eligible regional employers could receive subsidies of up to 75 per cent of the apprentice's award wage in the first year, 50 per cent in the second year and 25 per cent in the third year.

The trial is expected to support up to 1,630 new apprentices in areas such as plumbing, mechanical, electrical, painting trades and hairdressing.

Creating long-term jobs in Wide Bay

A \$7.3 million Regional Jobs and Investment Package is helping create more than 300 jobs in Wide Bay, by jointly funding six new projects to stimulate new employment.

The Liberal Nationals Government funding includes:

- \$5 million to expand Nolan Meats processing facilities, creating 245 jobs at **Gympie**.
- \$1.75 million to generate 30 jobs at Dale and Meyers sawmill in Maryborough by creating a new product line.
- \$267,400 to expand Teys Australia's cattle hide processing plant at Murgon.
- \$270,000 for two projects at Suncoast Macadamias at Glanmire, improving factory output.
- \$10,000 to provide skills and training to help Rainbow Beach tourism operators expand.

New Gympie *headspace* is here to help

A bright, welcoming new *headspace* service is now open in **Gympie** offering mental health assistance for people aged 12 to 25.

It is delivering a range of services including mental and physical health, alcohol and drug prevention, and social and vocational advice, in a safe, supportive and comfortable environment. Gympie *headspace* is one of 10 new services announced as part of the Government's \$28.9 million additional investment in regional and rural mental health care.

The service is operated by United Synergies and is funded through the Central Queensland, Wide Bay, Sunshine Coast PHN.



DELIVERING ON OUR PLAN

The Federal Liberal Nationals Government is delivering for all Australians with a plan to support local jobs, secure our borders and help local families get ahead.





403,100 more jobs created in 2017 - the most jobs created in a calendar year on record. Jobs growth in 2017 was almost five times stronger than Labor's last year.



Small business tax cuts

Tax cuts for 3.2 million businesses employing 6.7 million Australians.



Instant asset write-off

Used last year by 300,000 small businesses to invest in new equipment and machinery.



Affordable, reliable energy

The Coalition's plan for affordable and reliable power gets big power companies under control, so we can give the power back to the customers and get their prices down



More exports

Rural exports up 19% last year, as we are locking in benefits from landmark trade agreements with China, Japan and South Korea.



Record infrastructure investment

Record \$75 billion investment in highway upgrades, congestion busting roads, rail projects, improved local roads, inland rail and a new airport.



Fixing the Budget

Over \$37 billion in Budget savings since the election. We have halved the growth in spending (4% per year under Labor, 1.9% under the Coalition).



Tackling union lawlessness

Australian Building and **Construction Commission restored** to protect small businesses and the economy from CFMEU lawlessness. Secret payments banned between businesses and unions.



Tax relief

Bv 2024-25 around 94% of taxpavers are projected to have a marginal tax rate of 32.5 per cent or less compared with 63% previously.



Secure borders

17 detention centres closed, saving the Budget billions.



Fighting terror

14 major terrorist plots have been foiled. The Government is boosting our security agencies, has introduced tougher anti-terror laws and is revoking citizenship of dual nationals who engage in terrorism.



✓ Deporting criminals

We've changed the rules to deport non-citizens who commit serious crimes. The Government has cancelled visas of more than 3,000 serious criminals - including murderers, rapists, child sex offenders, armed robbers and drug dealers.



Tackling scourge of ice

AFP has seized over 14 tonnes of ice since 2013. Record funding for law enforcement and treatment. Wastewater surveys show a recent drop in ice use.



A stronger defence force

Undertaking the largest regeneration of our Navy since WW2, with 54 new ships (Labor commissioned none). With new weapons and air defence for our Army and new air combat capability, we're building Australia's sovereign defence capability.



Cracking down on paedophiles

Introduced Carly's Law, which has already led to high profile arrests. Banned registered sex offenders from holding an Australian passport. Introduced legislation that means paedophiles would spend longer in jail, be less likely to get bail or parole and face mandatory sentences.



Stronger citizenship

We have put forward legislation to ensure new Australians are committed to our values and can successfully integrate. This includes requiring applicants to demonstrate integration into the community; and expanding the powers to revoke citizenship.



More affordable child care

Landmark reforms abolishing the \$7,500 cap for families (incomes up to \$185,000) and introducing a new Child Care Subsidy, means around one million families are now better off.



More schools funding

Record schools funding means parents can send their child to the school of their choice. It means certainty for teachers so they can focus on the classroom and students. It means more resources for students so that they can get the best for their future.



Better health care

Over 85% of GP visits bulk billed last year - 21 million more than Labor's last year. Hospital funding at record levels and new reforms introduced to improve private health insurance.



✓ Drought support

A new \$5 billion Future Drought Fund will support our farmers and communities against future droughts.



Immunisations

KEEPING AUSTRALIANS TOGETHER

From next year all 12 and 13 year olds will get free protection against the HPV virus and cervical cancer.

Our No Jab, No Pay policy resulted in 210,000 extra children immunised in its first year.



Welfare to work

We believe the best form of welfare is a job. We've reinvigorated Work for the Dole (105,000 participants last year). We're changing compliance rules and requiring welfare recipients on drugs to undertake available treatment.

Bruce Highway upgrades to start

Work will start soon on major safety upgrade of a 4.7 kilometre stretch of the Bruce Highway at **Chatsworth**, north of Gympie.

The \$12 million upgrade will provide safer travel conditions and enhance traffic flow, by upgrading eight intersections and adding dedicated turning lanes.

Noosa bridges to open to traffic

Two new bridges will soon be open, improving safety at Mary River Road in **Cooroy** and Old Noosa Road in **Cooran**.

The Mary River Road Bridge, Old Noosa Road Bridge, and Orealla Bridge at **Sunrise Beach** are being upgraded through \$2.4 million in funding under the Federal Government's Bridges Renewal Program.

The upgrade and replacement of these bridges will improve traffic flow and road conditions for residents and visitors.

Counter Road sealing works nearing completion

Work to seal a 1.9km stretch of Counter Road at **Wolvi** should be complete within weeks, improving travel time between **Noosa** and **Cooloola Coast**.

Federal Member for Wide Bay Llew O'Brien said the project delivered on his 2016 election commitment.

"This improves safety, capacity and access for local residents, industry and tourists," Mr O'Brien said.

Cherbourg Aboriginal radio service back on air

South Burnett radio listeners can once again enjoy their local Indigenous broadcasting service, which has been brought back on air thanks to an Australian Government grant.

The Liberal Nationals Government will invest more than \$580,000 into the new service managed by the **Cherbourg** Aboriginal Shire Council, to be broadcasted from the former "Us Mob" radio studio in Cherbourg.

"The reinstatement of this service will keep the community informed and facilitate the sharing of Indigenous culture, news and events, which is crucial to maintaining a strong and proud regional community," Member for Wide Bay Llew O'Brien said.



\$5 million to replace Coondoo Creek Bridge

The Liberal Nationals Government has stepped in to keep drivers safe with a \$5 million commitment to reconstruct the notorious Coondoo Creek Bridge on Tin Can Bay Road.

Mr O'Brien said the bridge is a vital connection between **Gympie** and the **Cooloola Coast** and its upgrade will enable the smoother and safer carriage of people and goods, and will boost the economy.

"The Federal Government's funding is enabling this bridge on a State road to be replaced. It should have been done by the State Government a decade ago," he said.

Call for Royal Commission to protect dairy farmers

Wide Bay MP Llew O'Brien has welcomed the Government's move towards a mandatory code of conduct for the dairy industry but believes a judicial inquiry is needed into the practices of the supermarket giants.

"While the Government is consulting with the dairy industry to determine how best a mandatory code would operate, I believe a Royal Commission is warranted," Mr O'Brien said.

"A Royal Commission would have the power to examine the supply chain to benefit suppliers and consumers alike."
